Space flight was uplifting At age 90, Star Trek legend William Shatner reminds us anything is possible

The world so badly needed William Shatner's most elevated experience Wednesday morning.

We needed something wild — extraordinary, if you will to text, email, tweet and talk about rather than the constant COVID-19 conversation chewing our away at our mental health.

The down-trotten tone of COVID-19 news, especially for Albertans, is enough for anyone to hourly pronounce: "I'm going to bed and covering up my head."

Seeing a 90-year-old man — but who is really counting, right? — literally jettisoned into space in a rocket needs to not only be rousing heralded and welcome ... but with a hearty embrace to subtly remind us anything is possible.

We need that Born in Montreal in a Jew-



ish family, Shatner became a North American icon playing Captain James T. Kirk in 1966 in Star Trek on NBC.

Along with other Treckies — Lt. Commander Scott, Lt. Sulu and, of course, Dr. Spock — Shatner's character zoomed around in the Starship Enterprise. It was science fiction, of course, with good versus bad — all at the speed of light. And, faster.

But despite the Enterprise's warp speed and its ability to effortlessly glide through galaxies, the altimeter on the television report card — the proverbial ratings — was barely moving.

Through 79 episodes over three seasons, NBC pulled the plug on the show — remarkably, Star Trek never got higher than No. 3.

Perhaps it was ahead of its time even though — when you really think about it — a

man walked on the moon's surface mere months after cancellation.

Shatner couldn't shake the stereotype role of comfortably sitting in a spaceship's commander's chair with his hand, calmly, on the rudder. Yet, his

popularity remained and still is a household name for people who remember the television series, whether they were fans or not.

Personally, I wasn't. But I certainly knew who he was, and his obvious fascination of space and all of its unexplained wonder.

Shatner has a long list of television and film credits, including documentaries, including hosting The Truth is in The Stars on Bell Media's The Movie Network.

In 2018, Shatner flew to Cambridge, England, to meet the formidable scientist Stephen Hawking. Oh, to be a fly on the wall off the room where that interview took place.

Shatner's aura — mystical, adventurous, quirky, anything-goes — is easy to take. It challenges us to look beyond and be curious.

After a 10-minute flight in

space, speeding at 2,800 km/h and landing safely in a west Texas desert, Shatner emerged from the white top of the spacecraft jubilant and emotional.

He sent history books back to the printer: Shatner became the oldest person to go into space.

His example to push the envelope is something we all can learn from. To keep going.

We are going to get through COVID-19. But we have an important journey still before us.

The epic line from Star Trek: "Where no man has gone before." For some, that could be seeing a sliver of hope in this cruel pandemic. How reassuring William Shatner leads the way.
